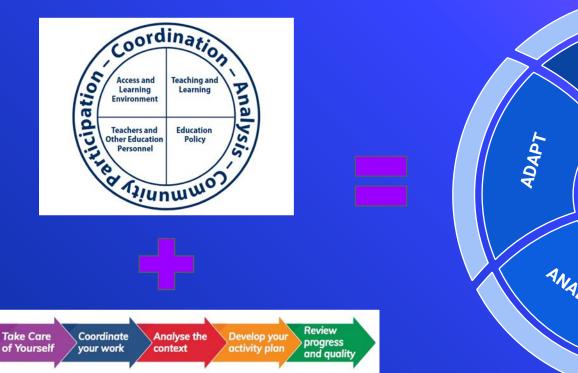


#### Educational Leadership EdD Program

- Multiple modalities
  - Online, hybrid, F2F
- Multiple tracks
  - pK-12, higher ed, nurse educator, & CCLI
- Accelerated courses
  - 8 weeks & 6 weeks



#### **Education in Emergencies**





### Care: Support Well-Being

- Gender, age, disability, socioeconomic status, cultural background, profession, and other identity factors might affect how crisis is experienced
  - Everyone has unique coping skills: some are resilient while others are highly distressed
- Education can provide stability



#### **Caring Strategies**

- Acknowledge impact on self and others
  - Communicate that it's not business as usual
- Instructor well-being
  - Self-care
  - Reflection and sharing
- Student well-being
  - Safeguarding
  - Mind the cognitive load

"Set a schedule. Get up everyday. Get dressed, Eat."

### Reduce Stress & Provide Stability

- Set expectations early
- Be explicit about how you will continue class if there is a disruption
  - What platform will you use?
  - Will you work synchronously or asynchronously?

"Be specific & state how you will communicate. Every professor is different."

Coordinate: Working Together

Coordination is a multi-level, multi-office activity

- <u>Classroom</u>: Collaborative and instructorguided active learning
- Programmatic: Leverage existing resources and relationships across courses
- Institutional: Collaborate with advisors and other campus professionals to assist students in need



#### Coordinating Strategies

- Help students set personal goals
  - Illustrate connection between goals and learning activities
- Collaborate with colleagues
  - Scaffold work across courses, if you can
  - Leverage existing resources (DEAG, YouTube, etc)
- Ask your students what they need

#### Affirm: "Do No Harm"

- "Do No Harm" is considered an essential basis for the work of organisations and professionals operating in emergencies
- Identify the unintended negative or positive impacts of activities in crisis contexts
- Resources = power





#### **Affirming Strategies**

- Evaluate what resources are needed minimize differential impact
- Use course resources to empower students
  - For example, not everyone has access to the internet or a computer
    - Create/identify/use learning materials that are easily accessed on a mobile phone or tablet
    - Use OER or other freely available materials
- Build community
  - Best when students have shared goals, know when and how to contribute, share rewards, and reflect on progress

#### **Analyze the Context**

- "Crisis" is a dynamic, multi-faceted event that doesn't have a definitive end point
- Use data to understand, assess, plan, and monitor facilities, students, and learning during crisis
- Analysis must include the whole "classroom" and student needs and, importantly, their assets
- More than a one shot activity: important to reanalyze the changing contexts during crisis



#### **Analyzing Strategies**

- Collect some baseline data
- Use LMS data, short polls, and formal/informal conversations
  - Access to consistent internet?
  - Learning devices?
  - Quiet spaces?
  - Time?
  - Discontinued learning?
- Monitor and check back in with students



#### Adapt!

- Flexibility is key in crisis
- Builds capacity to respond effectively to future crisis
- Consider the context continually
  - Not all interventions are appropriate to your class and students' needs
  - Still room for experimentation



#### **Adapting Strategies**

- Should be based on incoming data from student monitoring and check ins
  - Extending or easing deadlines, etc.
  - Decrease time to feedback to students
- May require high touch
- Consider reducing, but not eliminating group work
  - Purposefulness is key

# Being Prepared to Move Online

#### Use Summer to Prepare

- Have a LMS shell ready
- Post your syllabus
- Upload online resources
- Exchange contact information with your students and among students

## Familiarize Yourself with LMS Resources

- Announcements
- Screen sharing
- White board
- Group breakouts
- Gradebook
- Course analytics



#### Communication

- Preschedule much of your communication (LMS announcements)
  - Weekly overview
  - Reminders
  - Anticipated difficulties or confusion
  - Scheduled online office hours
- Reach out to students (proactively)
- Establishes a constant presence

## Advice for New Online Learners (from our students)

- Take time to explore the LMS
- List assignments in a weekly calendar and check off as you complete them
- Plan for your course reading and take notes before attempting the assignments

"If you do not know how to do something online YouTube a video to watch or ask google"

"You can no longer rely on attending class each week motivate you to read, you really have to make that a priority and plan for it on your own."
